Restorative Practices at our School

During our recent Student Free Days (SFD) on Tuesday, 17th June 2025 and Wednesday, 18th June, 2025 our staff members were involved in **Restorative Practices** (RP) professional learning. In our training we learnt that when Restorative Practices are applied consistently this can produce positive outcomes in a variety of settings including improved social behaviour and a decrease in bullying and violence in schools. This approach is widely used around the world in a variety of industries and settings including schools.

The aim of the training was to provide staff with proactive and responsive strategies for strengthening and repairing relationships to enhance the work they do in the classroom and in the yard.

All staff, including our Teachers, SSO's Clontarf Team, and Front Office staff were involved in understanding the importance of positive relationships, reframing language and rules to focus on *what is desired rather than what is prohibited*...eg "no shouting" becomes "use a quiet voice" and introducing "circle time" in classrooms, particularly in our CPC (Child Protection Curriculum) lessons to encourage participation and respect.

It has been inspiring to see teachers using elements of the training in their classes, including implementing "circle time" in their CPC lessons and secondary teachers using circle time to introduce new topics to their students.

As a follow up in Term 3 2025, the RP team will be returning to CPAS to run workshops with our students and interested parents/caregivers.

Semester 2 2025

The start of Term 3 2025 (Monday, 21/07/2025) will see the commencement of Semester 2 2025.

Our subject offerings in the primary school will remain the same to ensure curriculum accessibility for all our students. There will be some slight staffing changes in line with our school resources, student learning and school needs.

The Language program (Mandarin) will continue for our Years 3/4 and Years 5/6 students in Semester 2 2025.

Please speak to your child/children's teacher or leadership if you require any specific information or details.

The subject offerings in our secondary school will see some slight changes with the introduction of a Language (Mandarin) program in the Year 7 class.

Our Years 9/10 class will be offered two SACE subjects (Stage 1 Physical Education and Stage 2 Food & Hospitality) in addition to 4 other subjects (English, Mathematics, Science and HASS). This is to offer our students in this cohort an opportunity to work towards their SACE pathway/completion journey. Some of our students (mainly in Year 10) in this cohort have been offered places at the Port Augusta Technical College during the semester to participate in some industry training programs in their area of interest (Cookery & Tourism and Multi-Trades).

We do have a SACE 'traffic lights' tracking system for all our SACE subjects/students and Ms Aki and Mr Price will be in contact with parents/caregivers of our Years 9/10 students at the start of the Semester and seek their support accordingly.

Our Years 11/12 students will be accessing more SACE subjects/options in relation to their individualised SACE completion/pathways journeys in Semester 2 2025.

Parents/caregivers and individual students were heavily involved in the subject selection process.

Exploring Algebra Through Digital Tools

Our students have been introduced to the exciting world of algebra. They have been learning to represent algebraic expressions in different ways and have had the opportunity to deepen their understanding through a handson digital activity.

Using an interactive online program, students built algebraic tiles to visually model

expressions and practice collecting like terms.



This engaging approach has helped make abstract algebraic concepts more concrete and accessible.

By manipulating the tiles, students developed a stronger grasp of key ideas such as variables and simplification.



In addition to reinforcing student mathematical thinking, the activity also supported the development of their ICT skills, as they confidently navigated and interacted with the digital learning environment.

Year 7 Camp- Civics in the City- Adelaide In Term 2, our Year 7 students explored the fundamentals of Australia's democracy, focusing on the roles and responsibilities of different government levels.



Our Year 7 HASS students learning about the process of voting such as enrolling, sorting out preferential voting and how the Members of Parliament are elected.



The camp offered a hands-on learning experience that brought the HASS curriculum to life. Students participated in an engaging session on the importance of voting with Paula Hensing from the Electoral Commission and explored the two main chambers of Parliament with our local Member of Parliament, Mr Eddie Hughes.



Following the Parliament House visit, students went to the South Australian Migration Museum to enhance their understanding of Australia's migrant history and the rights and freedoms of First Nations peoples. We also visited the South Australian Museum for The Viking Age: Galloway Hoard Exhibition, which sparked students' curiosity about ancient civilisations and provided a preview of topics they will explore in Year 8 HASS. We are incredibly grateful to **Parliament** House and the South Australian Museum for welcoming us so warmly. Both institutions expressed interest in hosting Coober Pedy Area School again in the future — and we're looking forward to the next opportunity!
